

Bird and Mammal Sightings at Canopy Tower and Canopy Lodge

Below is a list of the birds and mammals I saw during my stay at Canopy Tower and Canopy Lodge from October 4 through 26, 2012. Because I was in Panama for all or part of 23 days, I saw many species more than once. For more information about the sightings, please refer to my field notes.

BIRDS

Great Tinamou – One seen on Pipeline Road, heard most days around the Tower.

Little Tinamou – One seen near the entrance to Pipeline Road.

Black-bellied Whistling Duck – Most common duck, seen on numerous days.

Blue-winged Teal – Flocks seen on trip to Caribbean side of Canal.

Gray-headed Chachalaca – Seen and/or heard numerous days.

Crested Bobwhite – One seen at Juan Hombron.

Marbled Wood-Quail – Two seen on Pipeline Road.

Wood Stork – Two seen at Juan Hombron.

Magnificent Frigatebird – Seen numerous days, common near Pacific.

Blue-footed Booby – Distant sighting of many from Santa Clara.

Brown Booby - Distant sighting of a few from Santa Clara.

Neotropic Cormorant – Common near Pacific.

Anhinga – Downtown Panama City, Juan Hombron, flyover at Discovery Center tower.

Brown Pelican - Common near Pacific.

Rufescent Tiger-Heron – Numerous sightings, including one on nest at Ammo Ponds.

Great Blue Heron – Two seen at Gamboa.

Cocoi Heron – Two flyovers on Semaphore Hill Road.

Great Egret – Common in numerous places.

Snowy Egret – A few at both Gatun Locks and Juan Hombron.

Little Blue Heron – Some at Gatun Locks, Juan Hombron, and a few other places.

Cattle Egret – Common in numerous places.

Green Heron – Seen in numerous places.

Yellow-crowned Night-Heron – One seen at Juan Hombron.

Boat-billed Heron – Two seen at Summit Ponds, including one on nest.

White Ibis – A few seen at Juan Hombron.

Glossy Ibis – Two flew by Canopy Tower observation deck.

Black Vulture – Extremely common almost every day.

Turkey Vulture – Extremely common almost every day, sometimes thousands.

Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture – Quite a few at Juan Hombron.

King Vulture – One seen from Discovery Center tower, another at the Kaufmann House.

Osprey – Seen on numerous days.

Gray-headed Kite – One soaring very high near base of Semaphore Hill Road.

Hook-billed Kite – One seen from Discovery Center tower.

White-tailed Kite – One flew by Canopy Tower observation deck, another seen in Tocumen.

Snail Kite – Two seen at Discovery Center ponds, another in Tocumen.

Mississippi Kite – Seven flew by Kaufmann House.

Plumbeous Kite – One seen flying high over Ammo Ponds.

Crane Hawk – One scoped from Canopy Tower observation deck.

Semiplumbeous Hawk – One seen on Semaphore Hill Road.

White Hawk – Seen on four days, including at Kaufmann House.

Common Black Hawk – Five seen around Gatun Locks.

Great Black-Hawk – Seen from Discovery Center tower, also in Altos del Maria.

Savanna Hawk – Four seen at Juan Hombron, also in field at domestic airport in Panama City.

Roadside Hawk – Four seen at Juan Hombron and a few others on other days in highlands.

Broad-winged Hawk – 10,000 at Cerro Azul, many on other days.
Gray Hawk – One at Discovery Center tower, another on Semaphore Hill Road.
Short-tailed Hawk - One seen at Gatun Locks.
Swainson's Hawk – Two seen from Tower observation deck, seen on two other days.
Zone-tailed Hawk – One seen at the Metro Park, another at Cerro Azul.
Black Hawk-Eagle – A few sightings, including one at Discovery Center.
Ornate Hawk-Eagle – One on Las Minas Trail.

Barred Forest-Falcon – Heard only, on Las Minas Trail.
Collared Forest-Falcon – One seen at Gamboa Resort.
Crested Caracara – Five seen at Juan Hombron.
Yellow-headed Caracara – Common on numerous days, including two mating at Ammo Ponds.
American Kestrel – A pair seen at both Gatun Locks and Juan Hombron.
Aplomado Falcon – One seen near nest at Juan Hombron.
Bat Falcon – Seen numerous days, first two perched on tower near Summit Ponds.
Peregrine Falcon – Pair seen at Altos del Maria, seen on two other days.

White-throated Crake – One seen at close range at Ammo Ponds, heard numerous days.
Gray-necked Wood-Rail – Seen four days, including at Ammo Ponds and road near Canopy Lodge.
Purple Gallinule – Seen numerous days, including with chicks at Gamboa Resort.
Common Moorhen – Seen numerous days, including at Discovery Center ponds.

Limpkin – One seen in field on Achote Road.

Southern Lapwing – Very common in numerous places.

Black-necked Stilt – Numerous seen on flats at Panama Viejo.

Wattled Jacana – Numerous seen on numerous days.

Spotted Sandpiper – Seen on four days, including four at Gatun Locks, one at Gamboa Resort.
Solitary Sandpiper – One at Juan Hombron.
Willet – Seen on four days, including on beach at Santa Clara.
Whimbrel – Seen on three days, including at Santa Clara and on domestic airfield in Panama City.
Short-billed Dowitcher – Seen on flats at Panama Viejo.

Laughing Gull – Many seen in Panama City on first day on drive from airport.
Black Tern – Fleeting glimpse in Tocumen.

Rock Pigeon – Common in urban areas.
Pale-vented Pigeon – Seen on five days in numerous locations.
Scaled Pigeon – Seen on five days, including from Canopy Tower observation deck.
Mourning Dove – One seen at Juan Hombron.
Plain-breasted Ground-Dove – One seen at El Chiru.
Ruddy Ground Dove – Common bird seen on numerous days in numerous habitats.
Blue Ground-Dove – One seen at Rio Indio.

White-tipped Dove – Common species seen on numerous days in numerous habitats.
Gray-chested Dove – Fleeting glimpse of one on Pipeline Road.
Ruddy Quail-Dove – One seen at La Mesa.

Brown-throated Parakeet – Two seen at Juan Hombron.
Orange-chinned Parakeet – Seen on numerous days in numerous habitats in lowlands.
Blue-fronted Parrotlet – Fleeting glimpses at Cerro Jefe and Altos del Maria.
Brown-hooded Parrot – One seen at Cerro Azul, another heard at Altos del Maria.
Blue-headed Parrot – Seen numerous days.
Red-lored Parrot – Large flocks fly in to roost at Gamboa Resort.
Mealy Parrot – Seen from Canopy Tower observation deck.
Yellow-crowned Parrot – Fleeting glimpse of some flying near Tocumen Airport.

Squirrel Cuckoo – Common, seen many places, including from Canopy Tower observation deck.
Yellow-billed Cuckoo – One seen at Ammo Ponds and five at Juan Hombron.
Greater Ani – Many seen in Providencia, six at Juan Hombron, and a few at the Ammo Ponds.
Smooth-billed Ani – Seen in numerous locations.
Groove-billed Ani – Seen only at Juan Hombron, where they were plentiful.

Tropical Screech-Owl – One seen at Cariguana.
Choco Screech-Owl – One flushed by Howler Monkeys on Pipeline Road, landing 10 feet from us.
Spectacled Owl – One seen at Cariguana.
Mottled Owl – Pair roosting at Canopy Lodge, others heard around Canopy Tower.
Black-and-white Owl – One seen and four heard one night around Canopy Tower.

Common Nighthawk – One seen flying by Canopy Tower on two different days.

Common Potoo – One roosting at Metro Park entrance, active one on Semaphore Hill Road at night.

White-collared Swift – Eight to ten seen flying over Canopy Lodge.
Chimney Swift – Some seen at tower at Discovery Center.
Short-tailed Swift – Numerous seen in numerous places.
Band-rumped Swift – Numerous seen in numerous places, including at Canopy Tower.
Lesser Swallow-tailed Swift – Seen on four different days, including at Canopy Tower.

Rufous-breasted Hermit – One seen by group leader in Rio Indio.
Green Hermit – Seen on a few days, including at feeders at Kaufmann House.
Long-billed Hermit – Seen on numerous days.
Stripe-throated Hermit – Seen on numerous days.
White-tipped Sicklebill – Seen at Canopy Adventure, also near Kaufmann House.
Scaly-breasted Hummingbird – One seen in Providencia.
White-necked Jacobin – Common in various locations.
Brown Violet-ear – Seen at Kaufmann House.
Veraguan Mango (E) – One seen at Juan Hombron.
Violet-headed Hummingbird – Seen at Kaufmann House.
Rufous-crested Coquette -- Female seen on road to Altos del Maria, male near Canopy Lodge.

Green Thorntail – Female seen at Kaufmann House, male seen numerous days around La Mesa.
Garden Emerald – Seen in flowers at Canopy Lodge.
Violet-crowned Woodnymph – Common in numerous locations.
Violet-bellied Hummingbird – Seen at feeders at Discovery Center.
Sapphire-throated Hummingbird – Numerous seen at Juan Hombron, two at Fort San Lorenzo.
Violet-capped Hummingbird – Some seen at Kaufmann House.
Blue-chested Hummingbird – Common in numerous locations.
Snowy-bellied Hummingbird – Common in numerous locations.
Rufous-tailed Hummingbird – Common in numerous locations.
Snowcap – One seen in Altos del Maria.
White-vented Plumeleteer – Common in numerous locations.
Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer – Seen in numerous locations, including Kaufmann House.
Purple-throated Mountain-gem – One seen by guide in Altos del Maria.
Green-crowned Brilliant – Pair seen in Altos del Maria.
Purple-crowned Fairy – Seen in a few places, including feeders at Kaufmann House.
Long-billed Starthroat – In flowers at Canopy Lodge, also in Cerro Azul.

Slaty-tailed Trogon – Common in numerous locations.
Black-tailed Trogon – One seen in mangroves on Fort Sherman Road.
White-tailed Trogon – Seen on a few days, including three along Achiote Road.
Gartered Trogon – Common in numerous locations.
Black-throated Trogon – Seen on a few days, including at Cerro Azul.
Orange-bellied Trogon – Seen at Altos del Maria, none east of the Canal.

Tody Motmot – One seen on road to Altos del Maria.
Whooping Motmot – Seen in numerous places, but not as common as Rufous and Broad-billed.
Rufous Motmot – Seen at numerous locations, heard daily from Canopy Tower.
Broad-billed Motmot – Seen in numerous places, including Semaphore Hill Road.

Ringed Kingfisher – Seen on Achiote Road, at Gamboa Resort, and other places.
Belted Kingfisher – One seen at Gatun Locks.
Amazon Kingfisher – One seen at Ammo Ponds.
Green Kingfisher – Seen in Providencia and at Canopy Lodge.
Green-and-rufous Kingfisher – One seen by guide on road to Cerro Azul.
American Pygmy Kingfisher – One seen at Summit Zoo.

Barred Puffbird – Two seen at Rio Indio.
White-necked Puffbird – One seen at Gamboa Resort, another at Discovery Center tower.
Black-breasted Puffbird – Seen numerous days.
Pied Puffbird – One seen from Discovery Center tower.
White-whiskered Puffbird – Seen numerous days, including on Semaphore Hill Road.

Great Jacamar – One seen on Pipeline Road.

Spot-crowned Barbet – Seen on Achiote Road and at Canopy Lodge.
Blue-throated (Emerald) Toucanet – One seen at La Mesa.

Collared Aracari – Seen numerous days, including from Canopy Tower observation deck.
Yellow-eared Toucanet – One seen at Cerro Jefe.
Keel-billed Toucan – Seen numerous days, including from Canopy Tower observation deck.
Chestnut-mandibled Toucan – Seen numerous days, especially around Gamboa.

Black-cheeked Woodpecker – Seen numerous days.
Red-crowned Woodpecker – Most common woodpecker, seen numerous days.
Stripe-cheeked Woodpecker (E) – Two seen at Cerro Azul.
Cinnamon Woodpecker – Seen at base of Semaphore Hill Road, also on Pipeline Road.
Lineated Woodpecker – Seen four days in various places.
Crimson-crested Woodpecker – Seen on Achote Road, at Discover Center, and Gamboa Resort.

Scaly-throated Leaf-tosser – Heard by me, seen by others on Semaphore Hill Road, Plantation Trail.
Pale-breasted Spinetail – One seen at Juan Hombron.
Red-faced Spinetail – One seen at Altos del Maria.
Spotted Barbtail – One seen at Altos del Maria.
Buff-throated Foliage-gleaner – Three seen, including one on Pipeline Road.
Plain Xenops – Seen on numerous days in numerous locations.

Plain-brown Woodcreeper – Seen on four days, including on Pipeline and Semaphore Hill Roads.
Olivaceous Woodcreeper – One seen at Canopy Tower.
Wedge-billed Woodcreeper – Seen at Rio Indio and Altos del Maria.
Northern Barred-Woodcreeper – Seen at Gamboa Resort and on Pipeline Road.
Straight-billed Woodcreeper – Two seen in mangroves on Fort Sherman Road, one at Juan Hombron.
Cocoa Woodcreeper – Most common and widespread woodcreeper, seen numerous days.
Black-striped Woodcreeper – One seen on Pipeline Road.
Spotted Woodcreeper -- Seen on Las Minas Trail and La Mesa.
Streak-headed Woodcreeper – One seen on Achote and Semaphore Hill Roads and at Gamboa Resort.

Fasciated Antshrike – Many seen, including one on nest at base of Semaphore Hill Road.
Great Antshrike – Three seen at Gamboa Resort.
Barred Antshrike – Seen on a few days, including two at Juan Hombron.
Western Slaty-Antshrike – The most common antbird species, seen or heard most days around Tower.
Russet Antshrike – Two seen on Candelario Road.
Plain Antwren – Seen numerous days during week at Canopy Lodge.
Spot-crowned Antwren – Seen two different days along Pipeline Road.
Moustached Antwren – One seen on Pipeline Road.
Pacific Antwren – Two seen in Providencia.
Checker-throated Antwren – Seen on numerous days.
White-flanked Antwren – Seen on numerous days, with eight seen one day on Pipeline Road.
Slaty Antwren – Two seen on Candelario Road.
Dot-winged Antwren – Numerous seen during stay at Canopy Tower.
Dusky Antbird – Seen on Pipeline Road, at Gamboa Resort, and other places.
Jet Antbird – One seen at Rio Indio.
White-bellied Antbird – Two seen on Pipeline Road.
Chestnut-backed Antbird – Common, seen on numerous days.

Dull-mantled Antbird – Two seen at La Mesa.

Spotted Antbird – Seen in numerous places, including on Pipeline Road.

Bicolored Antbird – Seen at La Mesa and along Pipeline Road.

Ocellated Antbird – One seen on Pipeline Road.

Black-faced Antthrush – Heard many days, seen along Semaphore Hill and Pipeline Roads.

Black-crowned Antpitta – One seen at Altos del Maria.

Streak-chested Antpitta – Seen on Plantation and Pipeline Roads.

Brown-capped Tyrannulet – One seen from Canopy Tower, another at Rio Indio.

Southern Beardless-Tyrannulet – Seen at Rio Indio and Gamboa Resort.

Mouse-colored Tyrannulet – Four seen at Juan Hombron.

Yellow Tyrannulet – Seen at Metro Park and Gamboa Resort.

Yellow-crowned Tyrannulet – Seen at Summit Zoo, Metro Park, and Gamboa Resort.

Forest Elaenia – Seen at Gamboa Resort.

Yellow-bellied Elaenia – Most common elaenia, seen in numerous places.

Lesser Elaenia – One seen at Juan Hombron.

Olive-striped Flycatcher – Not seen by me, seen by others in highlands.

Ochre-bellied Flycatcher – Seen numerous times, including on Pipeline Road and in Cariguana.

Paltry Tyrannulet – Seen on numerous days.

Black-capped Pygmy-Tyrant – One seen on Semaphore Hill Road.

Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant – Seen numerous times in highlands.

Southern Bentbill – Many seen and heard at Metro Park.

Slate-headed Tody-Flycatcher – One seen at Juan Hombron.

Common Tody-Flycatcher – Seen numerous times, including at Tower.

Black-headed Tody-Flycatcher – Seen at Discovery Center, Rio Indio, and other places.

Olivaceous Flatbill – Seen on Plantation Road, at Gamboa Resort, and other places.

Yellow-olive Flycatcher – Seen at Summit Zoo and Metro Park.

Yellow-margined Flycatcher – Seen at base of Semaphore Hill Road.

Golden-crowned Spadebill – Seen on Plantation and Semaphore Hill Roads.

Ruddy-tailed Flycatcher – Seen on numerous days in lowlands.

Sulphur-rumped Flycatcher – Seen at La Mesa and Metro Park.

Black-tailed Flycatcher – Fleeting glimpse of one behind Ammo Ponds.

Tufted Flycatcher – Seen on Las Minas Trail and at Altos del Maria.

Olive-sided Flycatcher – Seen on Las Minas Trail, at Juan Hombron, and in Altos del Maria.

Eastern Wood-Pewee – Ubiquitous migrant throughout the trip.

Tropical Pewee – Seen at Canopy Tower.

Acadian Flycatcher – Seen at Metro Park.

Black Phoebe – One seen on road to Cerro Azul.

Long-tailed Tyrant – Seen in Providencia and on road to Altos del Maria.

Bright-rumped Attila – Seen at Discovery Center and Altos del Maria, heard frequently from Tower.

Rufous Mourner – Seen on Pipeline Road.

Dusky-capped Flycatcher – Seen at Gamboa Resort and Altos del Maria.

Panama Flycatcher – Six seen at Juan Hombron, another at Summit Zoo.

Great Crested Flycatcher – Seen at Alto del Maria and on Pipeline Road.

Lesser Kiskadee – Fairly common, including at Gamboa Resort and Discovery Center.

Great Kiskadee – Common and widespread.
Boat-billed Flycatcher – Seen at Ammo Ponds, Gamboa Resort, and Juan Hombron.
Rusty-margined Flycatcher – Some seen at Providencia.
Social Flycatcher – Common, seen on numerous days.
Gray-capped Flycatcher – Seen at Providencia.
Streaked Flycatcher – Seen on numerous days, including at Canopy Tower.
Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher – One at Altos del Maria, another on Pipeline Road.
Tropical Kingbird – Extremely common and widespread.
Eastern Kingbird – Seen at Discovery Center and Gamboa Resort.
Gray Kingbird – Seen at Canopy Tower and Juan Hombron.
Fork-tailed Flycatcher – Seen in Gamboa town, at Juan Hombron, El Chiru, and Gamboa Resort.

Thrush-Like Schiffornis – Seen at Cerro Jefe and on Candelario Road.
Speckled Mourner – One seen on Semaphore Hill Road.
Cinnamon Becard – Seen on Pipeline Road and at Gamboa Resort.
White-winged Becard – Not seen by me, seen by others behind Ammo Ponds.
Masked Tityra – Seen numerous places, including Achiote Road and Las Minas Trail.
Black-crowned Tityra – Seen on Achiote Road and at Discovery Center.

Purple-throated Fruitcrow – Many seen on Achiote and Pipeline Roads.
Blue Cotinga – Seen at Discovery Center, Canopy Tower, and Achiote Road.

Golden-collared Manakin – Seen on three days, including at Gamboa Resort.
White-ruffed Manakin – Two at Altos del Maria, one at Cerro Azul, one on Las Minas Trail.
Lance-tailed Manakin – Two at Juan Hombron.
Blue-crowned Manakin – Seen on five days, including on Pipeline and Semaphore Hill Roads.
Red-capped Manakin – Seen on four days, including Plantation and Pipeline Roads.

Yellow-throated Vireo – Seen at Altos del Maria and at Canopy Tower.
Philadelphia Vireo – One seen at base of Semaphore Hill Road.
Red-eyed Vireo – Common migrant seen in numerous places.
Scrub Greenlet – Seen at Gamboa Resort and Juan Hombron.
Golden-fronted Greenlet – Seen at Gamboa Resort.
Lesser Greenlet – Seen numerous days, including from Tower.
Green Shrike-Vireo – Seen at Canopy Tower and at Discovery Center, heard many days from Tower.
Rufous-browed Peppershrike – One seen at Juan Hombron.

Black-chested Jay – Seen at Providencia, Cerro Jefe, and Canopy Lodge.

Purple Martin – Seen at Discovery Center, Gamboa Resort, and Ammo Ponds.
Gray-breasted Martin – Very common, thousands seen around Tower on some days.
Mangrove Swallow – Seen at Gamboa Resort, Ammo Ponds, and Gatun Locks.
Northern Rough-winged Swallow – Seen at Providencia and Ammo Ponds.
Southern Rough-winged Swallow – Seen at Ammo Ponds, Discovery Center, and other places.
Bank Swallow (Sand Martin) – Four seen at Discovery Center.

Cliff Swallow – Seen at Ammo Ponds, Discovery Center, and Las Minas Trail.
Barn Swallow – Very common migrant seen in numerous places.

White-headed Wren – One seen on Achiote Road.
Black-bellied Wren – Seen on Pipeline Road.
Bay Wren – Seen on Achiote Road and at Canopy Lodge.
Rufous-breasted Wren – Seen at Metro Park and on Las Minas Trail.
Rufous-and-white Wren – Seen at Cariguana, Juan Hombron, and Metro Park.
Buff-breasted Wren – Seen at Gamboa Resort.
Plain Wren – Seen at Providencia and Rio Indio.
House Wren – Most common and widespread wren species.
Ochraceous Wren – Two seen at Altos del Maria.
White-breasted Wood-Wren – Seen and/or heard in numerous locations.
Gray-breasted Wood-Wren – Two seen at Altos del Maria.
Scaly-breasted Wren – Seen on Las Minas Trail and Candelario Road.
Song Wren – Seen on Pipeline Road.

Tawny-faced Gnatwren – Seen on Pipeline and Candelario Roads.
Long-billed Gnatwren – Seen on Semaphore Hill Road.
Tropical Gnatcatcher – Seen numerous places in lowlands, including from Canopy Tower.

Orange-billed Nightingale-Thrush – One seen at La Mesa.
Veery – One seen at Metro Park.
Swainson's Thrush – Common migrant, numerous seen and heard.
Wood Thrush – Not seen by me, but seen by guide on Plantation Road.
Pale-vented Thrush – One seen on Las Minas Trail.
Clay-colored Thrush – Numerous seen on most days, feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.

Tropical Mockingbird -- Seen on a few days, including at Ammo Ponds.

Golden-winged Warbler – Seen in a few places, including at Canopy Tower and Jordanal.
Tennessee Warbler – Common migrant, numerous seen, including at Canopy Tower.
Yellow Warbler – Common migrant, numerous seen in wetland and other areas.
Chestnut-sided Warbler – Fairly common migrant, seen at both Canopy Tower and Canopy Lodge.
Blackburnian Warbler – Fairly common migrant, only one male seen in breeding plumage.
Bay-breasted Warbler – Common during the last week of my visit.
Black-and-white Warbler – Seen at Metro Park and Cariguana.
American Redstart – One seen at Canopy Tower, two at Cerro Azul.
Prothonotary Warbler – Seen at Ammo Ponds and Metro Park.
Worm-eating Warbler – Not seen by me, but seen by others at Metro Park.
Northern Waterthrush – Very common migrant, seen numerous days.
Mourning Warbler – Seen on Las Minas Trail and at Gamboa Resort.
Canada Warbler – Seen on numerous days.
Rufous-capped Warbler – Feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.
Buff-rumped Warbler – Seen in stream near Canopy Lodge.

Bananaquit – Feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.

Common Bush-Tanager – Two seen on Las Minas Trail, another two at Altos del Maria.

Black-and-yellow Tanager – One seen at Cerro Azul, four at Altos del Maria.

Rosy Thrush-Tanager – One seen at Metro Park, another on road to Altos del Maria.

Dusky-faced Tanager – Two seen at La Mesa.

Gray-headed Tanager – Seen on Pipeline Road and at Gamboa Resort.

White-shouldered Tanager – Fairly common in lowlands, displaying group at Discovery Center.

Tawny-crested Tanager – One seen at La Mesa.

White-lined Tanager – Two seen at Jordanal.

Crimson-backed Tanager – Seen numerous days, feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.

Flame (Lemon)-rumped Tanager – Seen at Gamboa Resort, feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.

Blue-gray Tanager – Common, feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.

Palm Tanager – Common throughout trip, took food off dining tables at Canopy Tower.

Golden-hooded Tanager – Common in trees around Canopy Tower.

Plain-colored Tanager – Common in trees around Canopy Tower.

Rufous-winged Tanager – Fleeting glimpse of one at Cerro Jefe.

Bay-headed Tanager – Fairly common in highlands.

Emerald Tanager – One seen at Kaufmann House.

Silver-throated Tanager – Seen on numerous days in highlands.

Scarlet-thighed Dacnis – Two seen at Rio Indio.

Blue Dacnis – Common in trees around Canopy Tower.

Green Honeycreeper – Common in trees around Canopy Tower.

Shining Honeycreeper – A few seen at Cerro Azul.

Red-legged Honeycreeper – Seen on numerous days.

Streaked Saltator – One at Rio Indio, one at Juan Hombron, and two on Pipeline Road.

Buff-throated Saltator – Seen on numerous days.

Black-headed Saltator – One seen at Gamboa Resort.

Slate-colored Grosbeak – One seen on Semaphore Hill Road

Blue-black Grassquit – Seen at Cerro Azul and Juan Hombron.

Slate-colored Seedeater – A few seen at Jordanal.

Variable Seedeater – The most common finch seen.

Yellow-bellied Seedeater – Two seen on Las Minas Trail.

Ruddy-breasted Seedeater – Seen on numerous days.

Thick-billed Seed-Finch – Fairly common, including around Ammo Ponds.

Yellow-faced Grassquit – Seen in numerous places in highlands.

Wedge-tailed Grass-Finch – Two seen on Las Minas Road.

Orange-billed Sparrow – Seen at Canopy Adventure and a few other places.

Chestnut-capped Brush-Finch – Seen on Candelario Road and Las Minas Trail.

Black-striped Sparrow – Seen on numerous days.

Hepatic Tanager – Fairly common in highlands.

Summer Tanager – Fairly common migrant, seen around Canopy Tower.

Scarlet Tanager – Seen on numerous days, including some at Canopy Tower.

Red-crowned Ant-Tanager – Feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.
Red-throated Ant-Tanager – Seen at Gamboa Resort, Discovery Center, and Metro Park.
Olive Tanager – Seen at Cerro Jefe and Discovery Center.
Rose-breasted Grosbeak – Seen on numerous days.
Blue-black Grosbeak -- Seen at Cerro Azul and behind Ammo Ponds.

Red-breasted Blackbird – Many seen on way to Achiote Road.
Eastern Meadowlark – Seen on Las Minas Trail, at Juan Hombron, and at Cerro Azul.
Great-tailed Grackle – Extremely common in areas where there are people.
Giant Cowbird – One seen at Gamboa Resort.
Orchard Oriole – One seen on Achiote Road.
Yellow-backed Oriole – Seen on Achiote Road, at Summit Park, and on Pipeline Road.
Baltimore Oriole – Fairly common migrant, including at both Canopy Tower and Canopy Lodge.
Yellow-billed Cacique – One seen at Gamboa Resort.
Scarlet-rumped Cacique – Seen on Achiote Road and at Canopy Tower.
Yellow-rumped Cacique – Seen on Achiote Road and on Pipeline Road.
Crested Oropendola – One seen in Providencia, another on Las Minas Trail.
Chestnut-headed Oropendola – Seen on numerous days, including at Canopy Lodge feeders.

Yellow-crowned Euphonia – Seen at Gamboa Resort, Juan Hombron, and Altos del Maria.
Thick-billed Euphonia – Most common euphonia seen, feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.
Fulvous-vented Euphonia – Common in trees around Canopy Tower.
White-vented Euphonia – Seen at Cerro Azul.
Tawny-capped Euphonia – Feeder bird at Canopy Lodge.
Lesser Goldfinch – Seen at El Chiru and Cerro Azul.

MAMMALS

Central American Woolly Opossum – One seen while spotlighting on Semaphore Hill Road.

Northern Tamandua – Three seen, including on Pipeline Road and Plantation Road.

Hoffmann's Two-toed Sloth – Seen on four days, including on Semaphore Hill Road.

Brown-throated Three-toed Sloth – Common, including one outside Canopy Tower dining room.

Nine-banded Armadillo – One seen at Ammo Ponds.

Lesser Sac-winged Bat – One perched in roof of gazebo at Jordanal.

Common Tent-making Bat – Many near entrance to Summit Park Zoo.

Geoffroy's Tamarin – Seen on the Achiote Road and near the entrance to the Metro Park.

Panamanian (Western) Night Monkey – Seen in the Metro Park and on the Plantation Road.

White-faced Capuchin – Seen on the Achiote Road and at the Gamboa Resort.

Mantled Howler – Common, including at Canopy Tower, the Discovery Center, and Pipeline Road.

Variagated Squirrel – Fairly common; a young one climbed up my leg.

Red-tailed Squirrel – Fairly common, come to feeders at Canopy Lodge.

Western Pygmy Squirrel – Seen on two days around La Mesa.

Lesser Capybara – Large group seen at Gamboa Resort.

Central American Agouti – Extremely common, especially at Gamboa Resort.

Forest Rabbit – Not seen by me, but seen by others along Pipeline Road.

White-nosed Coati – Family group seen along Semaphore Hill Road.

Kinkajou – One seen at night from Canopy Tower dining area.

Tayra – Not seen by me but by others on Plantation Road and at Gamboa Resort.

Neotropical River Otter – One seen on Fort Sherman Road.
